How to make it happen:

- 1. Bring children to the outdoor space outside the centre.
- 2. Get the children to pretend that they are Little Red Riding Hoods. They will be tasked to send a birthday cake to their grandmother (Teacher shows children a model of a toy cake). Grandmother's house is located far away and they will need to remember the way back home. To solve the problem, the children can find pebbles to help them mark their routes from grandmother's house back.
- 3. Before they can send the birthday cake to grandmother, they will need to go on a pebble hunt to collect as many pebbles as possible for their task.
- 4. Children are encouraged to explore the area around the playground find pebbles.
- 5. Each child will be encouraged to find about three to four pebbles and place them in their baskets. Once the children have found the pebbles, the teacher will lead the children to the "grandmother's house" (Note: Walking route is about 100 metres). As they walk, the teacher would guide children to drop the pebbles on the ground.

Once children have completed the task, i.e., given the cakes to their grandmother, they will be guided to look out for the pebbles on the ground to make their way back to school, i.e., home. As the teacher guides the children in the walk, she encourages them to identify the direction that they are walking towards – left, right, down the slope etc.
