## How to make it happen:

- 1. Take a nature walk with children in the nearby park or open grass area with plants and shrubs.
- 2. Invite children to talk about what they can see and smell.
- 3. Have children look for fresh flowers and leaves. Provide a magnifying glass for each one to examine the patterns, shapes, lines, textures and colours of the leaves and flowers.
- 4. Direct them to look for dried leaves and withered flowers that they can find on the ground.
- 5. Get them to examine the dried leaves and flowers and compare them with the fresh ones and talk about the similarities and differences.
- 6. Provide a clip board with activity sheet for each child to record their findings and to draw a fresh and dried flower or leaf.
