Risk:

Pencils

- Be aware of those who are allergic to plants. To provide alternative material to children who have such allergy.
- Hazards along the pathways/immediate environment e.g. sharp objects, insect bites, wet weather.

Management:

- Teachers to scan the environment beforehand before bringing children to the intended outdoor space.
- Ensure children use mosquito patch or insect repellent before heading outdoor.
- Children are to place back the natural loose materials after they completed their collage creation.

How to make it happen:

- 1. Take your class on a nature walk.
- 2. Give each group picture cards of flowers (Bougainvillea, Spider Lily, Hibiscus, *Ixora congesta*), insects (butterfly/bees/millipede), trees or plants (cluster palm trees, bird nest, sealing wax palm, foxtail palm, raintree).
- 3. Their challenge is to count the number of flowers, insects, trees or plants that they can find during their nature walk and write the numeral on a piece of paper.
- 4. Next, stop at a spacious area where there are variety of loose parts and have them create a collage using the natural loose material around the area.
- 5. Give children an opportunity to share about their creations at the end of the sessions.
- 6. Teacher and children are encouraged to take pictures of their collage which they can add written documentations back in the classroom.
- 7. After the walk, teacher can get each group to present the total number of flowers, insects, trees or plants that they saw during the nature walk.
